## **Abstract**

Originated in England, English language is a West Germanic language that belongs to the Indo-European language family. From its introduction to the British Isles, the tremendous changes it experienced shaped and developed it into the current lingua franca. In order for English to become a dominant and significant language as it is now, it has gone through a development marked by significant historical events and cultural exchanges. This study analyses Anglo Saxon English/Old English which is considered as the foundation of Englishes that are spoken and studied today. The key area that is analysed in this study includes the morphological features of Anglo Saxon English along with its comparison to the Modern English translation.
